"Jaws at 50: Fear, Faith, and Facing the Deep"

This summer marks the 50th anniversary of *Jaws*, the blockbuster film released in the summer of 1975. I was in junior high back then and the film made me afraid to go swimming at the San Diego beaches! Directed by Steven Spielberg, *Jaws* became a cultural phenomenon. It's even going to be re-released in theaters this month. But beyond the suspense, the music, and the unforgettable shark, *Jaws* tells a story that still resonates with our lives

today—especially through the lens of faith.

The plot is simple: a great white shark terrorizes a seaside town. The local police chief, a marine biologist, and a grizzled fisherman set out to stop it. But as the story unfolds, the real drama is not just about the shark—it's about how people respond to fear.

In a way, *Jaws* is a modern parable. Fear drives people to deny danger, shift blame, and protect profits over people. Sound familiar? Just like in Scripture, we see how fear distorts judgment and leads to poor decisions. The Bible is full of stories where people, faced with fear, had to make a choice: trust God, or trust in themselves.

Consider the disciples on the Sea of Galilee, caught in a storm, terrified that they will drown. Jesus sleeps through it all. When they wake him in panic, he says, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" (Mark 4:40). It's not so different from Chief Brody's journey in Jaws. At first overwhelmed, he ultimately finds courage not in brute force but in facing the truth and doing what is right, no matter how terrifying the deep may be.

Fifty years later, *Jaws* reminds us of how fear can grow into something monstrous when left unchecked—but also how courage, community, and sacrifice can overcome it. In our own lives, we face many kinds of "sharks"—illness, loss, division, and anxiety about the future. But as Christians, we are not called to run from the water. We are called to step forward in faith, knowing that Christ is already in the boat with us.

So the next time you hear that unforgettable music or see the fin cutting through the waves, take a moment to ask: What am I afraid of? And where is Jesus in that fear?

Here's to 50 years of Jaws—and to a faith that is bigger than whatever swims beneath the surface.

Applying Bible Principles to Stewardship

hen Jesus Christ becomes Savior and Lord of a person's life, a new creation takes place (2 Cor. 5:17). Old things truly pass away, and new things take their place. This is nowhere more visible than with a person's outlook on money and material possessions.

Take Zacchaeus, for example. Here was a man who had made it to the top. He was literally "king of the hill" as he looked down over the city of Jericho. But the respect, friendship and status that Zacchaeus longed for had eluded him as people from all walks of life despised him. After all, he was the chief tax collector.

But when Jesus entered the life of this little man, the allegiance which Zacchaeus knew changed. He was no longer under the control of the world system as defined by Caesar. Now, he was accountable to Christ.

As Ken Gire points out in Intimate Moments with the Savior,

... his soul knows that account isn't good. The ledger is filled with entries of money extorted, money under the table, money skimmed off the top, money, money, money. That's the bottom line for Zacchaeus. The bottom line of a bankrupt life. But the Savior isn't looking for an audit. . . . Jesus is moved with compassion. . . . From behind the barriers he has erected around his heart, a flood of repentant feelings bursts forth. . . . What took a lifetime to accumulate, one sentence of devotion liquidates. And not by a token ten percent. Half to the poor. Fourfold to the defrauded. Look closely. Witness the miracle: a camel passing through the eye of a needle.

As Christians, those who proclaim by that title that we are children of God through faith in Jesus Christ, our perspective on life should be different than non-Christians. How we acquire money, how we use it, and how we give it away should mark us as being followers of Christ. And just as Zacchaeus welcomed Jesus into his home gladly following that life-changing encounter at the sycamore tree, we should welcome Christ's presence in our lives gladly, with great joy as He alters the way we give.

J. Alan Youngren wrote, "When we begin to give out of some legalistic need to perform as Christians, we are well on the way toward frustration and defeat in our stewardship. Before long this attitude can lead to carelessness in giving, then reduction in giving and, finally, defeat in other areas of our spiritual lives."

Or as Wayne Watts put it: "Giving is the friend of wealth, for with it comes joy and fulfillment rather than disappointment

The following prayer reminder is from Vera Freebourn, manager of our prayer partner prayer tree in PA.


There are so many needs and hurts in this world. This post is just incase someone needs it.


