Easter

T's that time of year when some folks on social media and some magazine writers will try to equate Easter with pre-Christian pagan traditions and claim Message that Christian understandings of resurrection have to do with new life and rebirth in Springtime.

It is true that the English word "Easter" is believed to have originated from the Old English word "Ēastre" or "Ēostre," which refers to a pagan festival celebrating the goddess Ēostre or Ostara. This festival was held in honor of the spring equinox, marking the arrival of spring and the renewal of life. Ēostre was associated with fertility, renewal, and the dawn. However, there is no mention of her until the 7th century. Also, German and English are the only languages that refer to the Resurrection holiday as "Easter." In many languages, the word for the Feast of the Resurrection is tied directly to Passover: *Pâques* (French), *Pascua* (Spanish), *Pask* (Swedish) and *Pascha* (Latin) all come directly from *Pesach*, the Hebrew word for Passover.

St. Paul connected the risen Christ to Passover. In 1 Corinthians 5:7, he refers to Jesus as the paschal lamb who has been sacrificed for his people's salvation. Add to that the fact that Jesus celebrated the Last Supper with his disciples during Passover and it makes sense that the Feast of the Resurrection is connected with the Jewish holiday.

So why do English speakers call the Resurrection "Easter?" The honest answer is that no one knows for sure. Just as current months often have the names of pagan gods, so the Christians of old Germany and England celebrated the Resurrection most often in the month associated with Eostre: Eosturmonath (now known as April). That's the most likely reason.

The important point to remember, however, is that Easter is not a pagan festival and we aren't commemorating a Germanic goddess, just as we don't celebrate the god Janus every New Year's Day or worship Thor every Thursday!

Most of the anti-Christian social media posts and magazine articles are silly attempts to claim Christians are just aping pagan customs. Historians are never going to figure out exactly where or when Easter was first used. It is one of the oldest Old English words and has been in use for over a millennium, making it impossible to detangle the strands of its history. And, in the end, it is unimportant whether Easter comes from the goddess of the dawn. In whatever language, Easter is a time of resurrection, a time to celebrate the risen Christ and God's promise of eternal life.

Applying Bible Principles

The vast majority of people like to excel at something. Most of us like to do what we do in a manner that is truly first-class. Whether we are involved in one of the trades, or whether we are working in a profession, we like to excel in what we do.

Similarly, in the Christian life, most of us like to demonstrate our love for the Lord in ways that will reflect properly on Him and that will bring honor to Him. As His servants, we take great care that our Christian service is of such quality that what we do for His sake is first-class. Thus, whether we sing a solo in a worship service at church, prepare a meal for someone who is a shut-in, or teach a Bible class, we strive to do what we do for God in the very best way possible.

The Apostle Paul indicates we are also to excel in the grace of giving. "You are so rich in all you have: in faith, speech, and knowledge, in your eagerness to help and in your love for us. And so we want you to be generous also in this service of love" (2 Cor. 8:7). In other words, just as we might seek to excel in other ways which demonstrate our Christian faith in action, we are also to excel in the "service of love" through giving.

In the context of the verse we just read, Paul commends the Macedonian Christians for giving as much as they were able and more. When we follow their example, we experience "grace giving" in action, not only giving as we are able, but also, giving beyond our ability. This is possible only as we demonstrate the fruit of the Christian life by the power of the Holy Spirit within us. As we step out by faith (which is one of the signs of a Spirit-controlled life), we are able to give in ways which might seem improbable or impossible at first. The Spirit of God thereby motivates us and compels us to excel in the grace of giving!


One anonymous writer penned these powerful words: "God has a storehouse of blessings. Prayer is the key to that storehouse. But faith both turns the key and unlocks the door."
