astorises lacktrians ust as Christians lead the way in abolishing the Atlantic slave trade and slavery, so ■ Christians lead the way in caring for animals, based on Biblical principles. (In fact, noted British abolitionist William Wilberforce was also a force in advocating an end to the cruelty of animals). Arthur Broome, an English clergyman, was an ardent campaigner for animal welfare and was one of a group of creators of the Royal Society

for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (RSPCA) in 1824. Broome often referred to Biblical principles and Christian mercy in his advocacy. Proverbs 12:10 reminds us "a righteous man has regard for the life of his beast, but the mercy of the wicked is cruel," and God opens the mouth of Balaam's donkey so that she can protest the beatings she has received (Numbers 22: 21-34).

Of course, Jews and Christians had ben advocating for animal welfare in Western culture for centuries. One notable example was Francis of Assisi (1181-1226), who had a special love for animals. One popular story about Francis concerns a wolf.

A wolf terrorized the inhabitants of the small Italian town. Not only did the wolf kill and devour livestock but it began to attack and devour humans. All attempts to kill the wolf failed and the people of the town would literally shut the town down in fear whenever the wolf would appear. Francis heard of this and decided to go and meet the wolf. The huge wolf rushed toward Francis as soon as he saw the saint approaching his lair. Francis made the sign of the cross and commanded the wolf in the name of God to stop his terrorizing of the town. Immediately, the wolf became docile before the saint. Francis went on to condemn the wolf for his attacks not just on animals but upon men and women who are made in the image of God. Francis told the wolf that if he ended his attacks, he would see to it that the inhabitants of Gubbio would provide him with the food he needed. The story goes that the wolf placed his paw in Francis' hand in agreement. Francis then walked the docile wolf back into the main square of Gubbio to the astonishment of the inhabitants and there reiterated the promise. Again, the wolf placed his paw in the saint's hand in agreement. The saint had tamed the wolf.

The story is legend but shares the truth of Francis' love for animals. With many other Christians, we bless animals on the Sunday nearest St. Francis Day (October 4th) which is October 8th this year. You are welcome to bring your animals to church, and we will bless them after worship under the trees outdoors. It's a tangible way of showing our love and concern for all of God's creation.

Applying Bible Principles

The Steinway piano has been the instrument of choice by masters of the keyboard for many years. Pianists such as Rubinstein, Cliburn, Horowitz, Rachmaninoff, and Liszt knew that a skillfully crafted instrument such as the Steinway produces a rich, wonderful sound.

Steinway pianos are built today the same way they were when Henry Steinway started the company in 1845. Two hundred craftsmen and 12,000 parts are required to produce one of these instruments. Most crucial is the rim-bending process where 18 layers of maple are bent around an iron press to create the shape of a Steinway grand. Five coats of lacquer are applied and hand-rubbed to give the piano its outer glow. Each key is tested 10,000 times to ensure quality and durability.

In a similar manner, Christians, followers of Jesus Christ, are being "handcrafted." We are pressed, formed and shaped to make us more and more like Him. We are polished until we "glow." We are tested in the laboratory of human experience to ensure quality and durability.

One of the ways in which we are made in Christ's image concerns our giving. 1 John 3:17 (why not take time to look it up in your Bible?) says that we demonstrate God's love when we see our brother or sister in need and give to meet that need. In fact, the Lord Jesus said that we are to love our neighbor just as we love ourselves, and the illustration He provided was that of the Good Samaritan.

Yes, we are to give to the Lord's work here at Redeemer Lutheran Church. Yes, we are to place a priority in our lives on supporting this ministry financially. But let's not limit ourselves and our service for Christ to the walls of our church. Instead, let's be alert to opportunities to demonstrate God's love to fellow-travelers on the road of life. When we do that, we are demonstrating to ourselves and to all who observe that we have been "handcrafted" in the likeness of the Lord Jesus Christ.






