Pastor's Thanksgiving Message

Think of that little band of people who crossed the Atlantic in a boat that was 26 feet by 112 feet and landed on the New England coast during a bitter cold winter in 1620. At times that first year food was so scarce that the daily ration was only five grains of corn! In early New England, it was the custom at Thanksgiving time to place five kernels of corn at every plate as a reminder of those stern days in the first winter. The

Pilgrims wanted their children to remember the sacrifice, sufferings, and hardships through which they had safely passed -- a hardship that made possible their settlement in a new land where they were free to practice their faith. They wanted to keep alive the memory of that sixty-three-day trip taken in the tiny Mayflower. They desired to keep alive the thought of that rock-bound coast, its inhospitable welcome, and the first terrible winter which took such a toll on lives. (As you may know, they had intended to land in Virginia, which would have been a bit warmer.)

Later that next year, the Pilgrims were surprised to discover a Native American, Squanto, who spoke English. (He had been enslaved and taken to Europe previously). He lived with the local Wampanoag tribe. With the assistance of Squanto as interpreter, the Wampanoag chief Massasoit negotiated an alliance with the Pilgrims, with a promise not to harm each other. They also promised that they would aid each other in the event of an attack from another tribe. William Bradford, the pilgrim leader, described Squanto as "a special instrument sent of God."

Squanto worked hard to prove his value to the Pilgrims as not only a vital communicator but also an expert on resources. He taught them how to cultivate crops that would help them get through the next brutal winter. The Pilgrims were delighted to find that corn and squash were easy to grow in the Massachusetts climate.

As an expression of their gratitude, the Pilgrims invited Squanto and around 90 Wampanoag to join them in a celebration of their first successful harvest in what they called the "New World."

A three-day feast that took place sometime between September or November of 1621, the first Thanksgiving featured fowl and deer on the table — and plenty of entertainment around the table as well.

St. Paul reminds us, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thess. 5:16-18) Continue to give thanks in all circumstances and a happy Thanksgiving holiday to all!

Applying Bible Principles

A wise person once observed, "Half of any task is having the right tool, and the other half is knowing what to do with it." Although we don't often consider it as such, money is a tool which God uses in our lives as a means of spiritual growth.

You see, money is not an end in and of itself. It is a means to an end. And in God's hands, one of its primary "ends" is to instruct us and to help us grow spiritually. God especially wants us to avoid our natural tendency which is a bent toward selfishness, greed, and hoarding. That's why the Lord Jesus said, "Watch out and guard yourselves from every kind of greed; because a person's true life is not made up of the things he owns, no matter how rich he may be" (Luke 12:15).

Well, if an individual's life does not consist in having a lot of possessions, in what does it consist? Jesus provided an insightful answer to that question in Matthew 6:20-21, where He said, "... store up riches for yourselves in heaven, where moths and rust cannot destroy, and robbers cannot break in and steal. For your heart will always be where your riches are."

Now, according to Jesus' teaching in the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25), there is nothing wrong with saving. There is nothing wrong with investing or earning interest on investments. There is nothing wrong with being a wise steward by planning for the future.

In fact, Jesus taught that those who do so are to be commended. But our primary emphasis as God's children is to make our investments in the "Bank of Heaven." When we do that, our investments are secure. They are not affected by inflation, by theft, by wear and tear, or anything of the kind.

There is only one way to make deposits in this special "bank": By giving to the Lord's work. Although the money is used here, it is credited to your eternal account. Each time you give your tithes and offerings at Redeemer Lutheran Church, you are giving to the Lord by investing for eternity. You are storing up "riches . . . in heaven" that will glorify God forever.

Just P.U.S.H.
