the rays of sunlight first appear on Easter morning, we gather to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. This tradition, the Easter Sunrise Service, is a powerful symbol of the dawn of new life and the triumph of light over darkness. But where did this practice originate?

While the Bible doesn't explicitly mandate a sunrise service, the imagery of the women going to the tomb "very early in the morning" (Mark 16:2, John 20:1) has long resonated with Christians. This early morning journey, undertaken while it was still dark, mirrors our own journey towards the light of Christ's resurrection.

The modern tradition of the Easter Sunrise Service, as we know it, is believed to have its roots in 18th-century Moravian communities in Herrnhut, Germany. In 1732, the Moravians held an early morning service on Easter Sunday at their cemetery, God's Acre, to commemorate Christ's resurrection. This simple act of gathering at dawn, in a place of remembrance, became a powerful expression of their faith.

The story goes that the young men of the community, filled with the joy of Easter, wished to celebrate in a special way. They gathered at the cemetery before dawn, singing hymns and proclaiming the resurrection. This practice spread throughout the Moravian communities and eventually reached the United States in the 18th century. In America, the tradition gained popularity in the late 18th and early 19th centuries, particularly in the Southern states. By the late 19th and early 20th centuries, it had become a widespread practice across various denominations. The symbolic significance of the sunrise is profound. Just as the sun rises, dispelling darkness and bringing new light, Jesus' resurrection brought light and hope to a world shrouded in sin and despair. The sunrise service serves as a tangible reminder of this transformative event.

On Easter Sunday (7:00 am this year), as we gather in the cool morning air, we join a long line of believers who have celebrated the resurrection at dawn. We remember the women who bravely went to the tomb, the Moravians who gathered in their cemetery, and all those who have found hope in the rising sun on Easter morning. This Easter, as the sun rises, let us remember the light of Christ that shines in our hearts. Let us rejoice in the new life we have in him, and let us carry that light with us throughout the year. May the dawn of Easter fill you with hope, joy, and the unwavering assurance of Christ's victory over death.

Applying Bible Principles

... Whatever you do, whether you eat or drink, do it all for God's glory" (1 Corinthians 10:31).

Shortly after World War II came to a close, Europe began picking up the pieces. Much of the Old Country had been ravaged by war and was in ruins. Perhaps the saddest sight of all was that of little orphaned children starving in the streets of those war-torn cities.

Early one chilly morning, an American soldier was making his way back to his barracks in London. As he turned the corner in his jeep, he spotted a little lad with his nose pressed to the window of a pastry shop. Inside, the cook was kneading dough for a fresh batch of doughnuts. The hungry boy stared in silence, watching every move. The soldier pulled his jeep to the curb, stopped, got out, and walked quietly over to where the little fellow was standing. Through the steamed-up window, he could see the mouthwatering morsels as they were being pulled from the oven, piping hot. The boy salivated and released a slight groan as he watched the cook place them ever so carefully into the glass case. The soldier's heart went out to the nameless orphan as he stood beside him.

"Son, would you like some of those?"

The boy was startled. "Well, yes, I would."

The American stepped inside and bought a dozen doughnuts, put them in a bag, and walked back to where the lad was standing in the foggy cold of the London morning. He smiled, held out the bag, and said simply, "Here you are."

As he turned to walk away, he felt a tug on his coat. He looked back and heard the child ask quietly, "Mister, are you God?"

There's an old saying that says, "Money talks." It does, you know. It speaks volumes about our priorities, about the things we think are most important, about our values. Money never speaks more clearly than when we use it to minister to someone in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. When that happens, money sends forth a radiant, powerful message about the love of Christ as we demonstrate our Christian faith in action.

The admonition from God's Word is clear: Whether we eat or drink or whatever we do, we are to do it for the glory of God. As you consider what God would have you give, and as you consider the commitments about money and giving you have made to him, are you doing what you are doing for his glory?

Remember the young boy's question of a man who befriended him: "Mister, are you God?" It's just possible, you know, that someone may experience your faith in action by how you use your money today and ask the very same question about you.

Symbols of Easter



The whole life cycle of the butterfly symbolizes the life of Christ. Stage 1: caterpillar stands for His life here on earth. Stage 2: the cocoon stage symbolizes the crucifixion and burial. Stage 3: the mature butterfly represent Christ's raising from the dead in a glorified body.



Easter eggs and baby chicks represent new life, just as new life is celebrated at Easter. Rabbits were also a symbol of abundant new life... some of these traditions date back to pagan times, and were kept when people turned to Christianity as a means of keeping something they were familiar with and then took on a religious meaning.



The white blossoms of the Easter Lily symbolize the purity of Jesus. As the lilies emerge from the earth in spring, they also symbolize new life and the resurrection of Jesus Christ.


