Paws & Praise!

St. Francis and the Blessing of Animals

Each year in early October, many churches around the world hold a Blessing of the Animals. Dogs on leashes, cats in carriers, even birds, rabbits, or goldfish in bowls are brought forward to receive a prayer of blessing. It is a joyful and sometimes noisy reminder that God's love extends to all creation.

This tradition is tied to **St. Francis of Assisi (1181–1226)**, whose feast day is celebrated on October 4. Francis is remembered for his deep devotion to Christ and his profound care for the poor, the sick, and the marginalized. He also had a special love for animals and nature, seeing all creatures as brothers and sisters under the care of one Creator. His famous *Canticle of the Sun* praises God through "Brother Sun" and "Sister Moon," and tells of a world where all creation sings together in harmony.

The Blessing of Animals is not just a sweet ceremony—it's a witness. It reminds us that God called the world "very good" in creation, that Jesus taught us about trust and provision by pointing to the birds of the air and the lilies of the field, and that Scripture promises all creation will be renewed in Christ. When we bless our pets, we give thanks for the companionship and joy they bring, and we are reminded of our calling to be faithful stewards of God's creation.

This year, we invite you to bring your pets—whether furry, feathered, or scaled—for a special Blessing of the Animals service. If your pet can't travel, you are welcome to bring a photo instead. Together we will give thanks for the gift of creation and rejoice that God's love embraces every living thing.

Our blessing this year will be at 10:45 a.m. on October 12th. Feel free to bring your pets to church with you and we will praise God with paws (or fins, or...)!

Applying Bible Principles

The Steinway piano has been the instrument of choice by masters of the key-board for many years. Pianists such as Rubinstein, Cliburn, Horowitz, Rachmaninoff, and Liszt knew that a skillfully crafted instrument such as the Steinway produces a rich, wonderful sound.


Steinway pianos are built today the same way they were when Henry Steinway started the company in 1845. Two hundred craftsmen and 12,000 parts are required to produce one of these instruments. Most crucial is the rim-bending process where 18 layers of maple are bent around an iron press to create the shape of a Steinway grand. Five coats of lacquer are applied and hand-rubbed to give the piano its outer glow. Each key is tested 10,000 times to ensure quality and durability.

In a similar manner, Christians, followers of Jesus Christ, are being "handcrafted." We are pressed, formed and shaped to make us more and more like Him. We are polished until we "glow." We are tested in the laboratory of human experience to ensure quality and durability.

One of the ways in which we are made in Christ's image concerns our giving. 1 John 3:17 (why not take time to look it up in your Bible?) says that we demonstrate God's love when we see our brother in need and give to meet that need. In fact, the Lord Jesus said that we are to love our neighbor just as we love ourselves, and the illustration He provided was that of the Good Samaritan.

Yes, we are to give to the Lord's work here at Redeemer Lutheran Church. Yes, we are to place a priority in our lives on supporting this ministry financially. But let's not limit ourselves and our service for Christ to the walls of our church. Instead, let's be alert to opportunities to demonstrate God's love to fellow-travelers on the road of life. When we do that, we are demonstrating to ourselves and to all who observe that we have been "handcrafted" in the likeness of the Lord Jesus Christ.



The 250th SAR Liberty Tree Program was rolled out at the Spring 2023 Leadership meeting by the NSSAR History 250 Committee's goal of planting 250 Liberty Trees for the 250th Anniversary with at least one tree in each state on or before July 4, 2026. We feel with by planting a Liberty Tree that it will help educate the public of the importance of the American Revolution and the sacrifices that were made to become our nation. Trees are installed with a dedication plaque.

History of the "Liberty Tree": The Liberty Tree (1646–1775) was a famous elm tree that stood in Boston, Massachusetts near Boston Common in the years before the American Revolution. In 1765, Patriots in Boston staged the first act of defiance against the British government at this tree. The tree became a rallying point for the growing resistance to the rule of Britain over the American Colonies, and the ground surrounding it became known as Liberty Hall. The Liberty Tree was felled in August 1775 by Loyalists. The Liberty Tree is a testament to the power of unity, resistance, and the enduring pursuit of freedom from tyranny.

MARTIN LUTHER: 1483-1546

Catholic Priest—Protestant Reformer— Hymnodist

In 1520, Martin Luther, an Augustinian priest, found himself in a serious controversy with the Catholic Church for publicizing his objections to the practice of selling indulgences. Eventually, Luther was excommunicated and threatened with being arrested and extradited to Rome for trial. He was placed in protective custody by a sympathetic German official and locked in a castle near Eisenach, Germany for over a year.

During his time being locked for his own safety, Martin Luther started to translate the Bible from Greek to German. He felt very strongly that people ought to be able to read the Holy Scriptures in their own language and also have the ability to speak directly to God through hymns in their own language. For this reason, he composed a hymn book for use by German congregations. With the translation of the New Testament in German in 1522, the publication of a hymn book in 1524, and the completion of the Old Testament translation in 1534, the foundation for the Protestant Reformation in Germany was set. In honor of Martin Luther, German Protestants became known as Lutherans.

If there was a theme song of the Reformation, it would have been *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*, Luther's powerful hymn based on the first verse of Psalm 46: "God is our refuge and strength". This hymn has been used in various settings, is translated into almost every language in the world and is the national hymn of Germany.

Martin Luther knew the power of congregational singing and saw it as a powerful tool for bringing all people closer to God. He wrote: "If anyone despises music, as all fanatics do, for him I have no liking; for music is a gift and grace of God, not an invention of men. Thus it drives out the devil and makes people cheerful. Then one forgets all wrath, impurity, and other devices."
